LETTER TO EDUCATORS, CAREGIVERS & ADVOCATES

Thank you for picking up this guide! Whether you're part of the LGBTQIA+ community, you practice allyship, or you're curious to learn more but aren't sure where to start, this guide is for you.

A note on language: LGBTQIA+ stands for Lesbian, Gay, Bi, Trans, Queer, Questioning, Intersex, Asexual, Aromantic, and more identities including pansexual, two-spirit, nonbinary, and genderqueer. While the word "queer" was historically used pejoratively and as a slur against members of the LGBTQIA+ community, many people today use it as an umbrella term to refer to the breadth of LGBTQIA+ identities and experiences (as well as to describe a more fluid and expansive individual identity). This guide's use of the word "queer" reflects the contemporary cultural shift towards reclaiming the term. Learn more about terminology in the glossary on pages 8–9 of this guide.

It can be difficult to obtain accurate, up-to-date statistics about the number of young people who identify under the LGBTQIA+ umbrella. However, whether or not they are out to themselves or you, you absolutely know queer children and interact with them in your classrooms, libraries, and communities. As a teacher, librarian, educator, or caregiver, how you interact with all children and teens around queerness matters. What literature you provide them with, and how you talk about both literature and identity, can have an immense, life-changing impact on the young people in your life. Everyone benefits from books with authentic representation of queer identities, whether that representation is a window, mirror, or sliding glass door (Bishop, Rudine Sims. "Windows, mirrors, and sliding glass doors." *Perspectives* 6.3 (1990): ix–xi). Books and literature are never neutral; by engaging with queer literature for children and young adults, you are disrupting the status quo that implies being cisgender, heterosexual, and allosexual are the default. You are showing children an expanded way of thinking and being that validates all children and all people.

If LGBTQIA+ identities are not your own, it might feel intimidating to engage with a range of identities with such vast and ever-changing vocabulary. Make sure to check out both the included glossary and suggested resources for additional perspectives. If you're a queer educator or librarian, it can be both joyful and emotionally exhausting to teach or highlight literature that reflects your experiences. Included are links to professional organizations with affinity groups.

We are experiencing an undeniable, joyous boom of queer literature for children and young adults of all ages, but it can be difficult to stay up to date on the latest quality representation. You'll find suggested resources for finding diverse LGBTQIA+ children's and young adult literature included in this guide. Unfortunately, many communities are experiencing significant pushback to supporting the rights and needs of queer youth and the inclusion of queer literature in classrooms and libraries. If you or anyone you know needs them, make sure to utilize the links to mental health and censorship hotlines included in this guide.

The work you are doing to support queer children and queer books is immeasurable. Thank you for all you do, and take care of yourselves.

WHY IT'S ESSENTIAL TO SUPPORT LGBTQIA+ YOUTH

IDENTITY

Nearly 10% of teens (ages 13–17) in the United States are lesbian, gay, bi, or trans. ♥

There are approximately 3.2 million LGBTQIA+ youth ages 8-18 in the U.S., and about half (52%) are people of color. ♣

More than 1 in 5 LGBTQIA+ youth describe themselves as something other than gay, lesbian, or bisexual. ♠

1 in 4 LGBTQIA+ youth identify outside of the gender binary. ♦

Only 50% of youth surveyed who identify as nonbinary also identify as transgender, while an additional 20% are not sure or are questioning if they are transgender. →

1 in 4 LGBTQIA+ youth use pronouns or pronoun combinations that fall outside the binary construction of gender. ←

1.4% of teens (ages 13–17) in the United States identify as transgender. ●

MENTAL HEALTH

60% of LGBTQIA+ teens reported experiencing discrimination in the past year based on their sexual orientation or gender identity. ◀

91% of transgender and nonbinary youth said that they have worried about transgender people being denied access to the bathroom due to state or local laws. ✖

56% of LGBTQIA+ teens who wanted mental health care were not able to access it. ◀

LGBTQIA+ youth who reported having at least one accepting adult in their life were 40% less likely to report a suicide attempt in the past year. U

LGBTQIA+ youth who reported having at least one LGBTQIA+ affirming space had 35% reduced odds of reporting a suicide attempt in the past year. ■

Less than 40% of LGBTQIA+ youth surveyed found their home to be LGBTQIA+-affirming. ◀

55% of LGBTQIA+ middle and high school students consider their school affirming. ✦

Trans and nonbinary youth whose pronouns are respected by the people they live with attempt suicide at half the rate of those who aren't. ✖

Trans and nonbinary youth who are able to change their name on legal documents are significantly less likely to attempt suicide. ✖

Nonbinary youth who reported that “no one” respected their pronouns had more than 2.5x the rate of attempting suicide compared to those who reported that “all or most of the people” they know respected their pronouns. ◀

Approximately 50% of transgender and nonbinary teens felt their school was gender-affirming. Those who did reported lower rates of attempting suicide. ◀

15% of LGBTQIA+ youth reported either being threatened with or forced to experience conversion therapy. ◀

Transgender and nonbinary young people who came out before age 13 had an increased risk of suicidality, and over half reported being physically threatened or harmed because of their identity. ☺

94% of respondents to the U.S. Trans Survey who have spent time as a different gender than the one they were assigned at birth reported being satisfied with their life. ■

RECOGNITION & INCLUSION OF LGBTQIA+ BOOKS FOR YOUTH

Books that address LGBTQIA+ topics and themes are receiving increased attention from reviewers and critics, bestseller lists, and regional and national awards that recognize excellence in literature across all genres, themes, and topics. National organizations like Lambda Literary, GLAAD, and the American Library Association have also established awards that specifically recognize exceptional queer representation in literature and media, including the Stonewall Book Award, the first and most enduring award of its kind.

In 2016, Alex Gino's groundbreaking debut, *Melissa*, won both a Stonewall Book Award and a Lambda Literary Award, and has since been recognized by over 19 state awards and "best of" lists. In this same year, *The Marvels* by Brian Selznick was a Lambda Literary Award finalist and won an NCTE Notable Children's Books in the Language Arts Award, in addition to being recognized on a dozen "best of" lists.

In 2019, Kacen Callender's debut, *Hurricane Child*, won both a Stonewall Book Award and a Lambda Literary Award. In 2020 and 2021, Callender's second middle-grade novel, *King and the Dragonflies*, won a National Book Award, a Lambda Literary Award, and a Boston Globe-Horn Book Award; it also received a Walter Honor and a Coretta Scott King Honor.

In 2021, Vitor Martins's *Here the Whole Time* and Lucas Rocha's *Where We Go from Here* each won a Global Literature in Libraries Initiatives Translated YA Book Prize and an International Latino Book Awards Medal for Best YA Book in Portuguese. In this same year, Leah Johnson's debut YA rom-com, *You Should See Me in a Crown*, was a Lambda Literary Award finalist, a Stonewall honor book, the inaugural Reese's YA Book Club pick, and the recipient of multiple starred reviews and inclusion on many state and national best-of-the-year lists.

In 2022, Molly Knox Ostertag's YA graphic novel *The Girl from the Sea* was a GLAAD Media Award nominee, and the Netflix television adaptation of Alice Oseman's *New York Times* bestselling graphic novel series, *Heartstopper*, was released to immense popular and critical acclaim.

In 2023, Ryan La Sala's YA horror novel *The Honeys* received YALSA's Odyssey Award, and was also named to YALSA's Best Fiction for Young Adults and Amazing Audiobooks lists alongside Alice Oseman's YA novel *Loveless*. *The Honeys*, *Loveless*, and Kacen Callender's middle-grade novel *Moonflower* were designated as Top Ten titles on ALA's 2023 Rainbow Book List. Lewis Hancox's debut YA graphic novel memoir, *Welcome to St. Hell: My Trans Teen Misadventure*, was designated a Top Ten title on YALSA's Great Graphic Novels for Teens list. Bill Konigsberg's YA historical fiction novel, *Destination Unknown*, was an SCBWI Golden Kite Award finalist.

In 2024, Kyle Lukoff became the first openly trans person to receive the ALA Children's Literature Lecture award, and *Stars in Their Eyes* by Jessica Walton and Aśka was awarded a Stonewall Honor. Ash Van Otterloo's *The Beautiful Something Else* was named a Lambda Literary Awards finalist; as of this printing, the winners have not yet been announced. Alice Oseman's *Heartstopper Vol. 5* was nominated for a GLAAD Award, and Ronnie Riley's debut *Jude Saves the World* was named a Rainbow List Top Ten title. Bill Konigsberg's *Destination Unknown*, Mason Deaver's *The Feeling of Falling in Love*, and Ryan La Sala's *Beholder* were also named to the 2024 Rainbow Book List alongside *Stars in Their Eyes*, *The Beautiful Something Else*, and two *Heartstopper* novellas.

These are just a few examples of the significant and sustained positive reception of LGBTQIA+ books for children and young adults in recent years, all of which contribute to increased access and awareness of books that reflect the diverse reality of our world. The life-changing impact of affirming representation for LGBTQIA+ youth cannot be overstated, and the scope of these awards and accolades further emphasizes the inherent value of queer representation in books for all readers.

GLOSSARY

Language is ever-changing. It is always important to ask the LGBTQIA+ people in your life what words they prefer for themselves. Here are some key words and phrases to know; the terms in this glossary are widely accepted amongst LGBTQIA+ people at the time of this printing.

agender: Having no gender identity.

allocishet: A term combining “allosexual/alloromantic,” “cisgender,” and “heterosexual/heteroromantic” that is used as a shorthand to describe people whose gender and sexuality are privileged by society.

alloromantic: Someone who is not aromantic; someone who consistently experiences romantic attraction. Sometimes shortened to “allo.”

allosexual: Someone who is not asexual; someone who consistently experiences sexual attraction. Sometimes shortened to “allo.”

aromantic: Experiencing little to no romantic attraction. Sometimes shortened to “aro.”

asexual: Experiencing little to no sexual attraction. Asexual people can be sex-repulsed, sex-neutral, or sex-positive. Some asexual people identify as gray-asexual (rarely experiencing sexual attraction) or demisexual (experiencing sexual attraction only after forming emotional intimacy). Often shortened to “ace.”

biromantic: Someone who is romantically attracted to people who share their gender and people of other genders. Sometimes shortened to “bi.”

bisexual: Someone who is sexually attracted to people who share their gender and people of other genders. Often shortened to “bi.”

cisgender: Someone whose current gender matches the gender they were assigned at birth. Sometimes shortened to “cis.”

demiboy/demigirl: Someone who identifies as partly a boy or partly a girl.

gay: Someone who is attracted to people of the same gender. Traditionally used to describe men who are attracted to men, but it is sometimes used more expansively.

gender: A socially constructed category for dividing humans. An individual’s gender is often presumed by others based on assumptions about their gender expression, pronouns, and/or assigned sex, but an individual’s gender identity can only be determined by the individual themselves.

gender dysphoria: A visceral discomfort or distress for some people when they feel their body or sex doesn’t “match” their gender.

gender euphoria: A feeling of joy and affirmation when a person’s gendered experience matches their gender identity.

gender expression: External expressions of a person’s gender that can include clothes, hair style, body language, and other aspects of appearance. Cultures often prescribe aspects of these expressions as “feminine” or “masculine,” but gender expression is varied. Someone’s gender should not be assumed by their gender expression.

gender identity: An individual's internal sense of their own gender.

genderfluid: An identity term for someone whose gender changes or fluctuates.

genderqueer: A broad term for someone whose gender identity subverts the supposed gender binary.

intersex: Someone whose primary and/or secondary sex characteristics do not neatly or obviously fit into the designators "male" or "female."

lesbian: Traditionally used to describe women who are attracted to women, some nonbinary people also use it to describe their attraction to women.

LGBTQIA+: An initialism that stands for lesbian, gay, bi, trans, queer or questioning, intersex, asexual/aromantic, and more (including pansexual, two-spirit, nonbinary, and genderqueer). Some versions rearrange the letters or add additional letters, such as 2SLGBTQIA+ (2S standing for two-spirit) or GLBT (an older and narrower arrangement).

nonbinary: Someone whose gender identity does not entirely align with, and/or falls outside of, one of the binary gender categories of man or woman. Many, but not all, nonbinary people also identify as trans. This term is used both as a specific identity for individuals and as an umbrella term. Sometimes shortened to "enby."

panromantic: Someone who is romantically attracted to people regardless of their gender. Sometimes shortened to "pan."

pansexual: Someone who is sexually attracted to people regardless of their gender. Sometimes shortened to "pan."

pronouns: Most people have pronouns that are sometimes used instead of their name. Some people do not have pronouns, instead using their name in all circumstances. Some people are comfortable with any pronouns. Some people use one set of pronouns (for example, just "he" or just "they"), while others use multiple (for example, "they/ze" or "he/she/they").

queer: A term historically wielded as an insult by allocishet people, "queer" has now been reappropriated by many—though not all—LGBTQIA+ people. It is now used in several ways: as an umbrella term and inclusive shorthand for referring to multiple specific identities within the LGBTQIA+ community; and as an identifier for a person who is not heterosexual and/or whose gender identity is not cisgender (without the need for further or more specific self-identification).

questioning: When someone is unsure of or reconsidering their gender identity or sexuality.

sapphic: A general term for women or femmes who are romantically and/or sexually attracted to women.

sex: Assigned at birth, sex is most often determined by external genitalia. Often assumed to be a binary of female and male, sex has significant variety and includes intersex.

sexual orientation: A pattern of sexual attraction to people with the same or different gender identities. Although romantic orientation is separate, they are often blended together both by individuals and culturally.

transgender: An umbrella term for people whose gender identity is different than the gender they were assigned at birth. While some transgender people also identify as nonbinary, many have a gender identity that is either "man" or "woman." Sometimes shortened to "trans."

two-spirit: An umbrella term specifically for Native American/First Nations/Indigenous people who do not identify within the colonialist gender binary. Sometimes shortened to "2S."

SCHOLASTIC LGBTQIA+ BOOK LIST

Use this grid to ensure your bookshelves include diverse LGBTQIA+ representation, and to support readers in finding books that depict specific queer identities and experiences.
